ANY ILLNESS NEEDS TREATMENT

The problems of drug and alcohol abuse have the potential to touch everyone's life. Addiction to substances is an illness without regard for age, gender, race, ethnicity, economic status or neighborhood. The cost in terms of both lives and dollars are overwhelming. A key point to remember is that addiction to substances is an illness, not a moral issue, and must be treated as such.

- *Do you question whether dependency on alcohol or other drugs is a problem for you or someone you care about?*
- *Do you use drugs or alcohol to handle stress or escape from life's problems?*
- *Have you unsuccessfully tried to cut down or quit using drugs or alcohol?*
- *Have you ever been in trouble with the law or have been arrested because of your alcohol or drug usage?*
- *Do you avoid people or places that do not support your alcohol or drug usage?*
- *Do you do things under the influence that you would not normally do?*

The more 'yes' answers, the more likely that there is a problem. If you suspect an alcohol or drug problem, the first step is to seek an assessment by a licensed drug and alcohol program or by a qualified physician, psychiatrist, or psychologist. The assessment will help to determine: if a problem exists, the need for treatment, and the level of treatment to best address the problem.

ACCESSING TREATMENT

COCA is committed to providing a full continuum of treatment options for Berks County residents who have no public or private health care benefits with which to access drug/alcohol treatment.

Private Insurance

If you have private insurance (Blue Cross, Aetna, US Healthcare, etc.), you should contact your insurance carrier to find out how to get into treatment. Usually the customer service number is on the back of your insurance card. If not, ask your employer's Human Resources department for the number. If you will be paying for treatment privately, contact your preferred treatment provider by telephone to arrange an appointment for an evaluation.

No Health Insurance

If you do not have health insurance and cannot pay the full cost of treatment, you may be eligible for public funds. To find out if you are eligible for Berks County public funds, you can go to the Treatment Access and Services Center, Berks County's Central Intake Unit OR call a local outpatient treatment provider, contracted with COCA, to schedule an assessment. They will determine if you are eligible for public funds to receive treatment services. Following an assessment and level of service determination, a referral to an appropriate treatment provider will be offered.

All individuals accessing public funds must undergo a liability assessment to determine the individual's co-pay responsibility. An individual may be required to apply for Pennsylvania Medical Assistance in order to determine his/her eligibility for this benefit. Medical

Assistance would not only cover the cost of drug and alcohol treatment, but allow the individual access to other necessary medical services. Individuals will be asked to submit:

Proof of residency which includes:

State ID or Driver's License

Letter from the referring agency

Utility bill or credit card statements

Letter from the Court or Probation Officer

Proof of income which includes:

Recent pay stub

Recent bank statement

Unemployment Compensation eligibility letter

SSD/SSDI award letter

Proof that your health insurance does not provide coverage for Substance Abuse/Behavioral Health

TREATMENT PROVIDERS

All COCA contracted treatment providers are licensed and undergo on-site inspection annually by the PA Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs. Additionally, COCA performs regular monitoring of each of its contracted providers to assure compliance with all regulations and guidelines.

Drug and alcohol treatment services are governed by both federal and Pennsylvania drug and alcohol confidentiality regulations. Additionally, all drug and alcohol treatment programs must adhere to the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA) developed to protect the security, confidentiality and integrity of health information. As such, the privacy of the clients and the services provided are strictly maintained.

In accordance with federal and state requirements, pregnant women are afforded preference with regard to access to treatment services funded by COCA.
